Top Tips for Stargazing

Stargazing is easy. Just go outside and look up! Wherever and whenever you look, there will always be something to see if the skies are clear.

You do not need specialist equipment; binoculars and a camera can be fun if you have them. If not your eyes alone can reveal many wonders of the cosmos.

Try to get away from artificial lights if you can as these pollute the night sky. If you have a red torch use this to preserve your night vision enabling you to see more!

Constellations

Constellations are patterns of stars as seen from Earth. Looking South, these patterns change depending on the time of year. However if you look North, we tend to see the same constellations but in differing places as the Earth rotateson its yearly journey around the Sun.
